Helmut Schmidt's name represents milestones in the European integration process and far-sighted action in times of major international challenges. When most people think of Helmut Schmidt, they probably think of the »crisis manager« with the »Elblotsenmütze« mariner's cap and cigarette, or the former political leader explaining world events to a wide audience.

Schmidt lived for parliamentary democracy,

with its fundamental principles of dialogue and compromise. As a pragmatist and political realist, he was also held in high regard well beyond his own Social Democratic Party. Freedom of expression and freedom of the press were fundamental values for the politician, commentator and elder statesman. Particularly in his younger years, Schmidt enjoyed spirited debate, while later preferring a calmer, fact-based style.

Characteristics often attributed to Helmut


Schmidt include ambition, the ability to learn quickly and great self-confidence. Another is a hunger for debate that is honed from an early age – and even as a schoolboy, one of Schmidt's hallmarks is his innate curiosity about the world.

Schmidt joins the SPD in 1946. Before this, Schmidt had served as a soldier in the Wehrmacht for eight years, before briefly being held as a prisoner of war. Schmidt completes a degree in economics in Hamburg. After a brief career as a public servant, Schmidt rises through the SPD's ranks and soon holds high-level positions in the party and in government.

Schmidt is committed to representative democracy. However, this quickly brings him into conflict with a grassroots movement in society calling for greater political participation. Schmidt views the political ideologies of these groups with scepticism. After his experiences of war and dictatorship, he is mistrusting of the great societal models of the 20th century.

- Schmidt's experiences and lessons from the war
- His political rise »between Barmbek and Bonn«
- Formative issues from the first decades after the war

Increasing living standards, humanizing the working world and delivering greater educational equity. These are the goals of Helmut Schmidt's social-liberal coalition. Schmidt continues the political agenda set by his predecessor, Willy Brandt.

But amidst economic and structural crises, the leeway for spending increasingly narrows.

Schmidt's chancellorship marks a transition from the »planning euphoria« of the 1960s to a calmer, pragmatic style of politics.

Schmidt's greatest strength in politics is his international outlook. However, in his own country Helmut Schmidt ultimately fails to reconcile the reform elements of the »new social movements« with his own understanding of Social Democratic politics – and Schmidt's party becomes less and less comfortable with the increasingly business-friendly stance taken by its FDP coalition partner.

The exhibition shows:

- Schmidt as the »media chancellor« and the impact of his political career on his personal life and health
- The great challenges during Schmidt's chancellorship and their relevance to the present day
- Major clashes over the balance between »freedom« and »security«

After almost 30 years as a full-time politician, Helmut Schmidt departs as Chancellor following the »constructive vote of no confidence« of 1 October 1982. All attempts to convince Schmidt to stand again in 1983 against his successor, Helmut Kohl (CDU), end in failure.

In May 1983, Helmut Schmidt takes on a new role: the publisher Gerd Bucerius asks him to become one of the editors at the weekly newspaper DIE ZEIT. In his new position, Schmidt takes every opportunity to press ahead with the »continuation of politics with other means«.


Schmidt works tirelessly on issues that are important to him: European integration and international security, as well as economic and financial matters. He flies extensively in the process, meeting old partners, but also making new contacts. A constant presence in the media, Schmidt's political judgement becomes increasingly sought after – the »old« Schmidt is far more popular with Germans than the Chancellor was.

Founding and functions



The Bundeskanzler-Helmut-Schmidt-Stiftung, established in 2017, remembers one of the most important German statesmen of the 20th century. As Minister for Home Affairs in Hamburg, leader of the SPD parliamentary group in the Bundestag, as a minister and above all as West Germany's fifth Chancellor, Helmut Schmidt was committed to democracy. Above and beyond his political impact, he also initiated and shaped debates in society as a commentator and public intellectual.

Taking the ideas and interests of its namesake as a starting point, the foundation stimulates current debates in three subject areas.

These are:

- The future of democracy and social cohesion in Germany
- The future of European integration and the role played by Europe, in promoting peace in a world that is increasingly being shaped by resurgent geopolitical rivalries
- The future of the welfare state and a just global economic order

The permanent exhibition in Hamburg's city centre and the Helmut Schmidt-Archiv at the residence in Hamburg-Langenhorn closely relate to the subject areas. In addition, archives and exhibition aim to

- Put the impact of Helmut Schmidt into current and historical context
- Increase interest in nearly a century of German and international contemporary history
- Support debates and research relating to contemporary history

Using a wide range of event formats, the foundation brings together representatives from a wide range of academic disciplines, civil society groups and political organizations together for discussion. We place a particular emphasis on young people to develop new perspectives for Germany and Europe in the 21st century.

Residence and archives

in Hamburg-Langenhorn

Loki and Helmut Schmidt's former residence, located at Neubergerweg 80 in Hamburg's Langenhorn district, is a home full of contemporary history. The private living quarters can be viewed in a virtual tour on the Internet. The Foundation also offers tours in small groups.

Around 3,200 folders, more than 600 metres of shelving: the archives that Helmut Schmidt bequeathed to us occupy an entire building in Neubergerweg. Schmidt's archives, as well as those from Loki Schmidt and Willi Berkhan, one of Helmut Schmidt's friends and political confidants, are available for academic research.







Looking into the living room of the Langenhorn home I 2020


